2018 MEMBERSHIP DUES

Thank you to everyone who has paid your 2018 FFI and FFMNTC Membership dues. We look forward to your friendship and participation in the coming year.

There has been a change: Annual dues for 2018 are \$35 per member as approved by our Club's Board of Directors. The deadline for 2018 dues is January 1, 2018.

Friendship Force International has moved to a dues structure that equalizes dues for everyone. The \$35 dues payment is divided into two parts: \$15 goes directly to FFI and \$20 stays with our Club. We use the \$20 to keep in touch with our local members through mailings and our website; for overhead on our quarterly, semi-annual and annual meetings and special gatherings; for outreach to the community and future members; and for general administrative costs. When funds allow, we sponsor members to attend FFI conferences to learn from other clubs around the world. We hope that you will continue your membership in 2018 and be part of our Friendship Force Club. We all count, whether we venture on Journeys to faraway places, host ambassadors, plan events, help inform our members or the community about our mission, serve on the Board of Directors, or just enjoy getting together to share stories of our adventures seeing the world.



A time to reminisce, laugh and catch up with old friends and make new ones

Berlin Friendship Force Trip out of Minnesota. It was truly impressive that Minnesota Friendship Force was able to pull off their trip to Berlin. In the spring of 1978, Friendship Force International filed for bankruptcy. The dedicated FF Club of Minnesota was not deterred and continued on with their task of finding 250 people to take their maiden trip to Berlin for 9 days. They gathered a group of people from Minnesota and surrounding states to make the trip.

The group of FF travelers believed that FF was a worthwhile program that would create better understanding in the world between people. They took a pre-trip survey on their expectations and when they returned, took another survey. The differences of attitude were noted and people who went on the trip definitely improved their beliefs about the culture and people of Berlin, Germany thus proving that FF would change the world through Friendship.

At this time the Berlin Wall was still standing. This group of visitors endured several cultural shock situations when they crossed over to East Berlin. As some of you may remember, the Wall wound its way through Berlin splitting buildings, families, friends and placed the city at odds politically and economically.

The wall was built of solid concrete. It was 15 feet tall with a barrel top to keep people from escaping by vaulting over it. Visitors to the Wall would stand on wooden platforms to view Eastern Berlin. The East German side was formidable. In order to deter escape from East Berlin, the Germans dusted the area with sand each day and would examine for tracks of would be escapees. Dogs patrolled the area and guards would sit in towers ready to shoot to kill. Also included were barbed wire and electric charged wire fences along with buried landmines. Small crosses marked the spots where people died trying to escape.

Communists encouraged visitors from West Berlin at a cost of \$15.00 per person for a half-day bus tour. This tour only showed new buildings and restored historic sites. The tour guides were providing propaganda for East Berlin. During the tour, guides stated there was no reason for anyone to want to escape this "perfect paradise". With no unemployment, free schools and medical services along with low rents, who would want to leave? Your passports were checked at least 4 times during the tour.

Contrasting East and West Berlin at this time: the West Berlin area was clean and modern filled with color and people were able to move around freely. While East Berlin was grim; with many of the buildings being

facades to impress visitors. During the tour the visitors were able to glimpse side streets that revealed bombed out areas from WWII still in existence. Very few people milled about in East Berlin.

Visitors were not allowed to take pictures for fear their cameras would be confiscated. No newspapers were allowed from West to East and no East Berlin money was taken out of the country. Vehicles were searched for stowaways.

The response of the FF travelers showed that wonderful friendships were forged during this visit. They came back with good memories of the people in West Berlin and a conclusion that Friendship Force did promote friendship and Universal Freedom.
