# **Challenges:**

We have always faced challenges as Friendship Force members. Remember those wonderful ambassadors you hosted while you struggled to understand what they wanted to tell you? Or the long air flights ending in a confusing airport in an unfamiliar country? Or your struggles to figure out the plumbing in a home far away? It's all part of the excitement and adventure.

Now, we have new challenges in fulfilling the basic mission of FFI. Our last out-going journey was a year ago with no opportunities for 2019. Our in-coming Germany journey for this year was cancelled as was our Russian in-coming for 2018. The national and international factors are beyond our control. Ironically, it makes the need for international friendships greater than ever. Hopefully, we will have more options for 2020.

# ART AND TRAIN JOURNEY - SWITZERLAND, OCTOBER 19-26, 2018

Although I had attended a regional meeting in Davenport, Iowa and the International Conference in Marrakesh, Morocco, Switzerland last fall was my first official Friendship Force Journey. I could write pages and pages but will sum up the experience in two words: Unique and Extraordinary.

Unique because the Art and Train Journey was the first of its kind; a cooperative venture between a developing club in Zurich assisting an existing club in Solothurn. Their efforts were seamless. I might even say, being Switzerland, the visit was handled like 'clock work.'

Our group of 12 from four different English-speaking countries were met in Zurich by matchless planners Regina Born and Magi Hess. We then boarded an early afternoon train to Solothurn where we were greeted by our hosts for the next 4 nights.

Each day we met at the train station and were off to Aarau, Bern, Lucerne, Lausanne and then taken to a museum and an art show prescreened by Regina and Magi. Each afternoon we

were free to visit a second art museum, take a guided tour of the city we were in, or spend the time exploring on our own.

From Lausanne we traveled on to Zurich, again being met by our hosts. The next day our final train ride took us to Davos, famed host to the World Economic Forum held each January. It is also home to the Kirchner Museum.

From our welcome dinner in Solothurn to our goodbye tea in Zurich, this journey was extraordinary from beginning to end. Gracious hosting, impeccable planning, kindness at every turn. Even the weather, exceptionally warm and sunny according to our Swiss hosts, added luster to our travels through the beauty that is Switzerland. I enjoyed every single minute and YES, Swiss trains do run on time!

#### MAKING THE BEST OF A LAYOVER

#### **Atlanta, Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport**

The airport became the location for the city's largest art exhibition. Look for Terminal E. One example is the 450 foot mural at Concourse A and B.

### **Beijing Capital International Airport**

Look for T3E where you will find a miniature imperial garden of the Summer Palace with pavilions and bridges. Enjoy the live music, dance or magic tricks.

# **Chicago O-Hare International Airport**

In the Terminal 3 Rotunda, you will find a naturally lit yoga studio with bamboo floors and TV video to help you through an exercise routine. Nearby you can experience the world's first aeroponic garden in an airport that supplies fresh produce like purple basil, Habanero peppers and bib lettuce to restaurants in the terminal.

### **Hong Kong International Airport**

In Terminal 2 you can actually play 9 holes of golf situated around an island lake. Also, in Terminal 2 you can watch an IMAX movie with special 4-D effects. If time allows, try going on a scavenger hunt for the optical illusions in artworks hiding around Terminal 1. There is also an Aviation Discovery Center where visitors can learn about the life of a commercial pilot in a cockpit and flight simulator.

#### **London Heathrow Airport**

In Terminal 5 there is a gallery for the Expo of Fine Art. Sofitel London Heathrow Hotel sponsors some of the sculptures on display. Sofitel also offers a high tea with scones and clotted cream.

#### **Los Angeles International Airport**

Children will enjoy the play area in the Great Hall while adults order local favorites for a picnic lunch at lnk Sack.

#### Paris, France Aeroport de Paris-Charles de Gaulle

For an unusual experience, go to Terminal 2 for the Instant Paris transit area. It offers a multilingual reading salon, coffee and comfortable chairs. Don't miss a virtual 3-D walk through Paris in real time.

#### **Tokyo Haneda International Airport**

In Terminal 1, third floor, Sushi Kyotatsu offers low key, old Tokyo style food. There are many other choices in the airport to sample local cuisine.
