Club Introduces "Great Decisions" Program

Our Club will be hosting a Great Decisions discussion group. Great Decisions is sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association, and is America's largest discussion program on world affairs. The program consists of eight topics to be discussed at eight meetings during 2022. There is a briefing-book (cost \$30) with material on each topic. A 20 to 30-minute video will be shown at each meeting, followed by a discussion. The topics are: Changing Demographics, Outer Space, Climate Change, Russia, Myanmar and ASEAN, The Quad Alliance, Industrial Policy, and (U.S.) Drug Policy in Latin America. This is intended to be an in-person event. The meetings will be held monthly starting in February, except for July, August and December. **The first meeting will be Monday, February 28 at 6:30 PM** at the home of Tom and Janet Scott, 1909 Fairmount Ave, St. Paul MN 55105. We will start out with some light desert, beverages and social time, followed by the video and discussion.

Through the years, Jane held important leadership roles on the FFMNTC Board including Communications Chair, Webmaster, Membership Chair, and Newsletter Editor. In 2018, as VP, Jane helped lead and promote the Club's 40th Anniversary Celebration. As Club president in 2019 and 2020, she led us through COVID-19 challenges, including changing Board and Membership Meetings to Zoom and directing the virtual Officer Elections in 2020 and 2021.

Our Friendship Force Story

Club Membership

We first heard about Friendship Force from friend and Club member, Werner Tismer, who was the principal of our kids' elementary school. We joined the Club in 1999, 44 years after we were married, and just 4 years after we both retired from the University of Minnesota.

Although we had already travelled to every continent, we learned much from Friendship Force that helped us become better world citizens. Our Friendship Force experiences include Journeys to Brazil, Ghana, Indonesia, Japan, Mongolia, Russia, Siberia, and Uganda, and hosting Ambassadors from Australia and Russia.

Our travels have taken us to about 120 countries with some repeats. India was always high on the list – we got there seven times. We travelled by train and car, with backpacks in Europe, went on group tours and Friendship Force Journeys, hired our own drivers and guides, worked and volunteered in Africa and Asia, and sailed to both ends of the earth on a retired Russian research/ice-breaker vessel.

We have met many people and experienced different cultures, foods, languages, and religions. We've been in deserts, forests, savannas, jungles, and mountains, and on water, ice and glaciers. Since we are both photographers, we've shared our stories of the world with many others. From 2003 to 2013 we both wrote multiple articles about our travels for the Club's newsletter, "The Ambassador."

Peace Corps Service

Jack was recruited to do psychiatric evaluations of potential Peace Corps Volunteers in the early sixties, shortly after the agency was formed. We were intrigued by Peace Corps service, but growing a family at the time. Fifty years later, in 2003, Jack came home one day and said: "Let's join the Peace Corps." I (Jane) thought he was out of his mind. We applied and were accepted with a flattering degree of enthusiasm. We were posted to Turkmenistan, one of the states in Central Asia formerly controlled by Russia.

We lived with a family, spoke Turkmen and used Russian in our work teaching public health. That meant four different alphabets as well as three languages which led to our major project of compiling a three-language medical dictionary.

We are grateful for the Club's donation to publishing our three-language medical dictionary. We gave it away free to medical professionals throughout the country. Overall, Peace Corps was a challenging, rewarding, amazing, and one-of-a-kind experience.

Open World 2017, 2018, 2019

The Open World program is a real winner for both of us. It is the closest thing to Peace Corps that we have experienced. Jane served on the planning committee for the Tajikistan ladies and the two Ukraine groups. Jack helped with the program for the medical delegates from Ukraine. We both delighted in hosting a farewell potluck at our home for each of the groups with delegates, home-hosts, other Club members and a few returned Peace Corps Volunteers.

Volunteering for FFMNTC

I (Jane) have always been interested in nonprofits

I had experience in writing, graphic design, and computer technology, as well as non-profit governance, so there was a lot to do. This included member communications, the website and newsletter, the member database, revising and applying the bylaws, annual registration with the MN SOS, reinstating the Club's non-profit status with the IRS, exemption from MN sales tax (denied).

I want to thank the Club for trusting me with documents, processes, and information that are essential to the Club's nonprofit status and its continued success in carrying out its mission.

Don Wolter Service Award Background

Maribeth and I were going to marry 58 years ago but split because of a misunderstanding caused by a lack of communication. We went our separate ways. During this time Maribeth lost two husbands, and I lost my wife, Juanita, in 2009 after she suffered from Alzheimer's for many years. Maribeth and I got back together four years ago because my little sister, Sheila kept asking, "What happened to Maribeth?" Neither Maribeth nor I ever dated after losing our spouses and certainly never dreamed that we would ever get together with someone, much less each other.

I finally found Maribeth on the computer, after finding her married name that she was using on Facebook. I sent her a message on Halloween four years ago. She recognized my name and picture, so she responded warily, "Is this a trick or a treat? "To which I replied, "It's not a trick, but you get to decide if it's a treat."

It turned out that she lived near my oldest daughter who lives on Bainbridge Island, WA. I always go out to Washington for Christmas, so after talking on the phone for 7 weeks, from Halloween until Christmas, Maribeth picked me up at the airport Dec. 22, 2017. Life has been an adventurous love story since then.

Back in high school, Maribeth's Aunt Margaret introduced us in 1960. Aunt Margaret was the head waitress at the Crossroads Cafe in Eau Claire, WI, where I was working. She noticed that Maribeth had her eye on me and said to Maribeth "Not him, don't even think about it." What better recommendation could a guy get?

We were friends for a long time before we started dating. After high school, Maribeth worked full time and went to the University of Wisconsin in our hometown, Eau Claire, while I went to Loras College in Dubuque, IA on a basketball scholarship, until an auto accident ended my sports career.

Maribeth was a special education teacher in Golden Valley, Chicago, and West Palm Beach for 47 years. I was a hospital administrator by trade and ran a consulting business focused on the hospital's relationship with its physicians and employees. Our client hospitals were primarily located in Minnesota and Maryland.

Part 2 Jim's Friendship Force Leadership Days

While Jim and Maribeth are now both members of our Minnesota FF Club, Jim has a long history of participation and leadership going back to the mid 1990's. His first wife, Juanita, worked at the State Senate with JC Bosse, who invited the Collins to get involved with our Club. They hosted a couple of ambassadors from New Zealand, and really enjoyed meeting new people from other countries. They also visited the ambassadors in New Zealand a few years after hosting them in the Twin Cities.

Juanita passed away in February of 2009 after a long battle with Alzheimer's. In 2010, Jim stepped forward as the Exchange Director (ED) for our Club's exchange to Indonesia. Along the way, Mary and Bill Cunningham, who had traveled frequently to Indonesia for Bill's work, coached Jim and directed him to their friend, Made, to serve as their local guide. At the time Made was a struggling artist, but now is internationally recognized for his traditional Balinese art. Jim also worked with Arifin Mochtar who at the time was serving on the Board of Directors for FFI. Jim, and now Maribeth, have maintained connections and friendships with both Arifin and Made and their wives for more than 10 years.

This Indonesian Exchange, which was featured on Travel-Tuesday, November 30, 2021, tested all the travelers, and especially their ED Jim, who exemplified "thinking on the fly" skills. As the Ambassadors were coming into Java, there was both a major volcanic eruption of Mount Merapi in Central Java, which disrupted all travel, and a 7.7 magnitude earthquake near the Mentawaii Islands, resulting in a tsunami that destroyed coastal towns and killed several hundred people. All this while Ambassadors were trying to make their way from the airport to their home stay in the mountains of central Java.

After demonstrating profound leadership skills, and bringing all the travelers safely home, Jim was elected as our Club vice president in 2011 and 2012, serving with president Blaine McCutchan. In 2013 and 2014 he served as our Club president. Louise Anderson was recruited as vice president in 2014, and then she became FFMNTC president in 2015 and 2016.

Our gratitude to Jim Collins for his contributions to our Club over the past twenty-five years, and to both Jim and Maribeth for staying active and enthusiastic today! Rita Mays

Travel Bytes

After more than a year of banning foreign leisure travelers from entering the US, the government announced that residents from other countries may visit with proof of vaccination, beginning in early November. They will also need to show proof of a negative Covid-19 test.

The European Union (EU) has taken the US off its safe-travel list, causing some countries like Spain, France and Denmark to bar unvaccinated leisure travelers from the US. EU countries' rules vary so travelers should do their research and check the CDC's country-specific recommendations.

The CDC continues to revise its travel recommendations for countries around the world recommending that people should currently not visit high-risk countries such as Great Britain, France and Iceland. For lower risk countries such as Italy, Mexico, Poland, Hungary, etc., the CDC still recommends being fully vaccinated before visiting. For people with an increased risk of severe illness, the CDC advises avoiding cruise ship and rivercruise travel.

Canada has opened its borders to US travelers who show proof of full vaccination and a pre-entry Covid-19 test. Meanwhile, the US continues to restrict travel to the US from its two closest neighbors, Canada and Mexico
